Pillerton Hersey Annual Parish Meeting – Minutes

7:00 pm, Thursday, 25 March 2021 Online via Zoom

The meeting was Chaired by Cllr. Newcombe who welcomed everyone and opened the meeting.

Apologies

Cllr. Forsyth had sent apologies.

Approval of minutes of previous Annual Parish Meeting, 30 May 2019

It was noted that due to the Covid-19 pandemic, there had been no annual parish meeting in 2020. It was resolved that the minutes from the previous annual parish meeting were a true and accurate record.

Report from the Poor's Lot trust

The accounts of the Poor's Lot trust were presented to the meeting by Terry Hitchman (appendix).

Brief report on PC activity since the last meeting (2019-20)

Cllr. Newcombe opened his report with a mention that there were currently two vacancies on the parish council and a vacancy on the Parochial Church Council.

Cllr Newcombe summarised activities that the parish council has coordinated including ditch clearance work, gulley watch, clearing culverts, renovation of the notice board and bench. The parish council also considers planning applications and responds to these. Other activities have included reporting of issues related to speeding traffic, road signage, and planting trees and wild flowers.

Brief report on activity planned for 2021 and into 2022

Looking forward, Cllr Newcombe requested residents provide feedback on:

- The Hersey Help Group on WhatsApp.
- Footpaths, including the path between Pillerton Hersey and Pillerton Priors

Guest speaker: Dr Jacky Lawrence, Low Carbon Warwickshire Network and Napton Environmental Action Team (NEAT), "What can a small rural community do to play its part in climate change adaptation and mitigation?"

Cllr Newcombe introduced Dr Jacky Lawrence from Napton who shared the experience of work in Napton and with Harbury to support the creation of low carbon communities. See appendix for presentation.

Residents shared that there are under pew heaters in the church while another observed that electric vans are now available.

It was acknowledged that Pillerton Hersey is a very small village and there was discussion about how this may work. Other examples of small parishes with activity are Hampton Lucy, Charlecote and Loxley. Examples include residents writing articles to inform others. Another resident observed that there is the community energy Warwickshire initiative.

Questions from residents

Cllr Newcombe thanked Dr Lawrence for sharing her experience. Then opened the floor to questions on village affairs.

Tree planting – a resident thought the idea of planting trees in the parish was a good idea. It was noted that there is a government scheme where parish councils can apply for free tree/hedging plants for planting on open ground. This raised the question of who would maintain the trees – this would be the parish council if they were planted on the village green areas.

Broadband – the ongoing issue about connection to broadband was mentioned. It was noted that the next phase of BT Openreach work has been announced.

Traffic speed – There have been concerns over the speed and inappropriate driving of vehicles through the village. It was observed that some include camouflaged vehicles that could come from local automotive companies. Options to encourage more appropriate speeds include rumble strips, however, these cause noise and Warwickshire Highways are currently not renewing existing strips.

Closing remarks

Cllr Newcombe thanked the residents and encouraged them to all consider future activities in the community.

Energy

The energy conversation began with talking about the problems associated with the way we currently consume fossil fuel energy resources — greenhouse gas emissions, other pollution, finite resources, wasted energy and the ageing electricity and gas infrastructure.

We shared ideas on what could be done to find out more about energy consumption and generation in the village, what could be done to improve energy efficiency and increase use of renewable energy technologies and the importance of communicating success stories.

We decided to begin an energy audit of the village starting with some of the community buildings & a small selection of homes and identify any land and roofs that could be used for a community energy project.

What happens next?

We need the people who are interested in energy to come together and take action.

Food and biodiversity

This conversation began with how wildlife needs our help, local food production, how too much food is wasted, and how more trees need to be planted.

We shared ideas on increasing habitat for wildlife in new builds and existing homes (rewilding, garden ponds, hedges, nest boxes, bat boxes, hedgehog highways etc.), garden & harvest shares, community orchards, the use of Parish, charity & other land for tree & wildflower planting and seed & plant swaps.

We decided to identify which land could be re-wilded or used for planting fruit and nut trees, encourage people to make their gardens more wildlife friendly and to promote local food options.

What happens next?

We need the people who are interested in food and biodiversity to come together and take action.

What we buy and what we waste

This conversation began with talking about all the individual deliveries that come to the village, the high mileage required to make those deliveries, how much repairable or re-usable stuff is taken to landfill and how confusing it can be knowing what can and what can't be recycled.

We shared ideas on how to coordinate village deliveries to reduce delivery miles, how to encourage composting rather than use of the expensive green bin, how to increase support for Southam Repair Café and how to promote the use of Facebook, Freecycle, e-bay etc. and increasing donations to Carriers of Hope to avoid useful but unwanted things being sent to landfill. We also talked about how to assist people to make best use of IT to sell or give away things.

We decided to see if it was possible to a establish a nominated supermarket delivery day and develop a central hub for information on how to reduce waste linked to the Napton Community Facebook page.

What happens next?

We need the people who are interested in waste and resource efficiency to come together and take action.

NAPTON ENVIRONMENTAL ACTION TEAM (NEAT) NEAT CONVERSATIONS, NAPTON VILLAGE HALL, 8TH DECEMBER 2019

Transport

The transport conversation began with talking about the environmental and health impacts of fossil fuels used in transport, journey planning, road safety, imposing 20 is plenty speed limits, one way systems for narrow roads where that would reduce speeding, lack of facilities for cycling or walking, public transport and electric vehicles.

We shared ideas on trip sharing, walking to school and work, developing a cycle path to Southam, car sharing and developing the infrastructure for electric vehicles.

We decided to see if it was possible to establish the principle of trip sharing to Southam, promote local food options, develop signage aimed at preventing engine idling and determine the potential for installing electric vehicle charge points at community buildings.

What happens next?

We need the people who are interested in transport to come together and take action.



Annual Report of Pillerton Hersey Parish Council

Year ended 31 March 2022

Welcome and thank you to everyone who has joined us. The last twelve months have seen a continuation of the community spirit that has helped residents through the Coronavirus pandemic. Although we have seen our world open up there have still been restrictions on our lives.

There have been several changes to the parish council over the last year, with long-serving councillors stepping down in May 2021. It is acknowledged that the changeover of councillors has presented challenges in proactive problem solving. At times, the priorities have focused on matters where the parish council has direct responsibility.

The councillors have worked hard to develop themselves as an effective group and this will continue so that they can build on this.

A core element of the parish council's work is to consider and respond to planning applications. The councillors have worked hard to ensure they are abreast of planning issues and respond.

To be effective, the parish council is developing a rolling business plan to consider how, with limited resources, it can be as effective as possible. With this foundation in place, the council will be able to adopt a more business-like approach that is required of parish councils today. Much of the business plan will build on the outcomes of the discussion and consultation of the residents at the 2021 annual assembly that was help online. There were key themes around the environment and road safety.

Connectivity is essential in the modern world, and as a small community it is recognised that Pillerton Hersey has the same needs as other communities. This has led the parish council to consider and respond to government consultations on topics such as rural broadband and the provision of local bus services.

The parish council has worked with both District and County Councillors to investigate opportunities for the reinstatement of the roadside footpath between Pillerton Hersey and Pillerton Priors. Unfortunately this has proved to be unviable due to costs.

The environment is of ongoing concern to residents and the parish council is considering ways in which it can support the maintenance and indeed enhancement of the parish environment. The parish council will continue to look at maintaining clear ditches in crucial places (while not compromising the natural verges), to help reduce the flood risk.

The issue of water supply has been a concern of residents, the parish council has asked, through its available channels, for residents to make the Clerk aware of times when they experience low water pressure. This will help the parish council identify trends and research if there have been other issues. If a body of evidence is produced, then this helps the parish council engage with Severn Trent to address the issue.

Finally, for many years, the ownership of the village green has been assumed but not registered. The parish council has started to resolve this issue for good. This will then ensure that access agreements can be appropriately put in place.

As we approach May 2022, there is one vacancy on the parish council. This will be filled at the next ordinary meeting.

This leads me to thank the other councillors, recent past and present for their time and effort as well as to residents who provide constructive engagement with the parish council. Also thanks to our Clerk who has worked hard behind the scenes to support and guide the parish council.

General Fund: mainly funded by the congregation and donations from individuals and families – pays for the cost of the vicar, clergy pensions and central costs of the Diocese (all shared with other parishes) and the building maintenance. Normally fete raises £3,000 which covers the shortfall (but not for last two years due to Covid).

Fabric Fund: accumulates over time with donations and legacies from people who want to give money only for the building maintenance, not religious services. Used to pay for major repairs when they arise.
